A great way to get your school more involved this year and to get ready for SC Walk to School Day is to participate in monthly themed walks! Get creative and allow students to dress up or receive themed incentives for completing the events each month!

Another encouragement activity your school may choose to implement is the **Walk Across America** challenge. Track students' steps each week and choose a goal to complete - such as walking the 3,300 miles coast to coast during one semester, walking across South Carolina, or following the Palmetto Trail. Create a challenge between classrooms and report the distance covered by [converting steps into miles](#). Grant Opportunity: Lowe's Toolbox for Education Grant

[Lowe's Charitable and Education Foundation](#) is donating more than \$5 million to public schools this school year. More than 1,000 schools will be awarded \$2,000 to \$5,000 to help support their school communities.

Preference will be given to funding requests that seek permanent impacts, such as facility enhancement and landscaping projects. Projects that could improve your school connectivity and safety for walkers and bikers might be good submittals - such as trail development, pedestrian crosswalks or signage, or bike racks. Spotlight on a Friend: Anderson School District 4 Leads on Wellness

School leaders in the Anderson School District 4 love wellness initiatives. In 2011, the District adopted a policy that includes healthy guidelines for food and beverages served prior to, during, and after the school day. The policy also promotes fund raisers and incorporates increased physical activity into classroom instruction. Under the direction of Deputy Superintendent, Dr. Joanne Avery, the District is working hard to educate and support healthy lifestyle choices for students, parents, and employees. During this school year, the District is focusing on three activities: Townville Elementary School's 5K Turkey Trot, student and staff wellness fairs, and South Carolina Safe Routes to School Day. Community groups including the Pendleton Pride in Motion and students in the 'Community Health Promotion' course at Clemson University will be assisting with SC Safe Routes to School Day on March 6th.

In addition, the Administrative Rule that guides implementation of the District's policy specifically mentions Safe Routes to School:

Anderson School District Four is committed to working to provide its students with a safe and easier way to walk and bike to school. When appropriate, the district will work together with local public works, public safety, and/or police departments in those efforts. The school district will explore the availability of federal "safe routes to school" funds, administered by the state department of transportation, to finance such improvements.
